Resurrection and Transformation...

One of the ongoing tensions in the life of faith is balancing our traditions and religious foundations with the need for transformation as we live fully into our callings as disciples. As we honor our history and traditions both individually and corporately, we are sometimes too bound by them. We forget that our Christian faith is founded on the hope and promise of resurrection. All of this brings to the forefront one of the fundamental questions of our faith life: what is it that needs to be diminished for something else to be resurrected? This question lifts up the reality that there are times we must leave some-

thing behind so that we can continue growing and deepening our relationship with God.

Yet even as we leave behind something, we know that what came before is often a foundation for what is to come. Too often we believe that new ideas and concepts are foreign to what has come before it. Rarely is this the case. Rather, resurrection is rooted in what has come before. In the Gospel of John, the resurrected Jesus even though he is transformed is recognized by his disciples in the way he speaks to them. Likewise in the Gospel of Luke, the resurrected Jesus, is recognized by the disciples on the Emmaus Road in the familiar acts of breaking bread and fellowship. In both cases, even though Jesus has been transformed and made new in resurrection, something familiar remained of who Jesus had always been.

As we seek to live into God's call for the future, we will be who we have always been. One of the things I appreciate about the UCC faith tradition is that we are anchored in the traditions of our predecessors. The vision for unity was born out our core theology, even as we transformed and listened to God's call, we were rooted in our core theology and faith. As we live the life of discipleship, whatever new thing we might discover in the future, have faith that it will be rooted in the great work that has come before.

This to me is the promise of our faith, the promise of resurrection. As we lament that things are not the way they used to be, let us also hold onto hope. Hope that when something beloved goes away, God may resurrect something even better. Something that will allow us to proclaim the Gospel to a new generation and in a new way; hope that God's Kingdom is always being built with each act of faithful witness.

There will be a collection tub in the West Narthex to drop off your donations. Thank you for your help with providing comfort and dignity to those in need!




Adopt a Highway Pickue p- Saturday, April 26, 9 am

Market St in Campbelltown. We will be picking up our normal route unless we have numerous volunteers, upon which we may pick up other Campbelltown "trashy" areas. We always appreciate a couple of volunteers to pick up old flower arrangements and trash in our cemetery. The sign up list will be available in the east foyer/ bell tower.

Adopt-a Highway Salem's Adopt a Highway history:

We performed our first clean up in 2003; thus we are in the midst of our 22nd year of service to the community. Generally speaking, trash volume has decreased over the years but it is still essential to address Route 117, Forge Rd. at least twice a year. With our 57 pickups thus far we have removed nearly 500 bags of trash and over 100 bags of recyclables. Over 80 different volunteers have helped with our cleanups. Hopefully, our efforts show our community and neighbors how much we care for them and the earth. (Note: Registration begins at 8:30 am. Light refreshments will be served.)

In honor of Earth Day, the Creation Care team would like to update you on a few of our activities and invite you to a few Earth-themed events.

- On Saturday 5/3 at 11:30am, meet at the Porch and Pantry for an Earth Day Walk and Lunch in Mt Gretna. It will be a casual hour-long walk in nature, open to walkers of all levels.
- On Saturday 4/12 at 9am, join us for Tree-Planting. Thanks to a generous grant of \$9,880 from the Penn Central Conference, we will be planting White Oak and Eastern Redbud trees and will be installing a Bat Box.* The grant also funded Salem's recent switch from fluorescent to LED lighting** for both internal and external lighting, decreasing our energy use and spending. - At 9am on Saturday 4/26, join us for Adopt-a-Highway trash pickup as part of Campbelltown Community Clean-up Day.

Stay tuned for a light-hearted update on Creation Care Team happenings as part of Holy Humor Sunday.*We don't want bats in our bell tower, but bat boxes allow our property to still provide a safe home for bats, which benefit the environment through pest control, pollination and biodiversity.**While incandescent bulbs release 90% of their energy as heat and CFLs release 80% of their energy as heat, LEDs emit very little heat. High-quality LED bulbs also can last 3-5 times longer than CFLs and 30 times longer than incandescent bulbs.

Date: February 10, 2025

Meeting Call to Order: 7:00 PM by Pres. Kaag

Opening Devotions: Faith Bixler led devotions and opening prayer

Approval of Agenda for tonight's meeting - approved by Unanimous Consent

Secretary's Report: January 13, 2025 council minutes approved by Unanimous Consent

Janitorial Position: Tom Peiffer explained the logistics of janitorial trial via Vista Autism Services. An individual named Tommy McHale did a trial run about a week ago with a job coach, Tom P, and Ron Kline present, which went well. Tom explained that we would be paying Tommy as an employee through the church. There will always be a job coach present (Luke or Greg). Tommy will work on Thursdays for a 6-hour day (9 AM - 4 PM with an hour lunch break)

Owen of Vista joined us via Zoom to answer questions.

Discussion included:

Contracting versus employee of the church. Contracting would not be feasible at this time.

Tommy does work a couple different jobs already.

We supply the cleaning supplies for him.

Job coach responsible for timesheet. Always a job coach with him.

Job coach would have keys to building

We will be liable for his worker's comp

3-month trial period

Tom made a motion to hire Tommy McHale on a 3-month trial basis working with Vista Autism services. Start date later this month. Joan Seconded. Passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Monthly receipts down 6.8% (January)

General fund – spent more than we took in by \$3,400

End of December negative cash balance (-\$2,800) in the Cemetery fund. Mainly caused by increased cost of cemetery mowing.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Matt reported on his routine activities, including planning worship services at Salem in addition to the Lebanon Valley Home (Jan 15) in January. He participated in several January committee meetings and the Chili making youth event. Confirmation classes are continuing and Pastor Matt assists with the Profile Committee. Pastor Matt continues to lead the Revelation Bible study on Sunday mornings.

Note: Every year UCC churches conference do a yearbook report – average worship, etc. Pat Young now has the ability to complete the report. Usually Jan to March the reporting is open for completion.

Old Business

- Jim will expand members for tech services (live virtual options for meetings and worship). Next step is to set a meeting / sign-up.
- **Profile Committee:** Cindy Umberger reported a summary of main items from small group work during the 1/26 congregational meeting:
 - Lot of hope for an energetic and engaging pastor that can relate to all age groups and one that offers good pastoral care
 - We'd really like to have growth, especially with younger families at the same time engaging in community outreach.
 - Every group said that the pastor should know what is happening but does not need to be involved in every aspect of the church. We don't want a micromanager came out pretty clearly
 - Several groups mentioned the strong caring family feeling in the congregation and how people have stepped up recently
 - Salem wants to continue to be an active, caring , self-sufficient and vibrant congregation committed to loving and serving others
 - We want to stay in this building and have worship services every Sunday keep traditional music/ contemporary/progressive thinking
 - Profile team has begun to assign questions we can answer now and is meeting again on 2/11 to go over our completed answers together and assign some more questions.

Sharing our Easter inheritance

After David Clarke's mother died in a cycling accident, she left him \$125,000. Inspired by how his mom had lived, he decided to share that inheritance with his community. Clarke chose four organizations that assist people in poverty, those with special needs and others. Liverpool (U.K.) Kids Plant to Plate received one-fourth of the money to teach urban kids about food growth and preparation. Team Oasis, which provides free meals and positive opportunities to disadvantaged families, also received 25% of the funds, as did two other nonprofits. Through Jesus' death and resurrection, we too have an inheritance (see Colossians 1:12). Because we did nothing to earn this abundant love and life — and because God teaches us to serve

and care for others — we look for ways to share it.

Unlike Clarke's monetary windfall, however, our gifts of salvation, grace, joy, love and blessing never run out. In fact, the more we share Jesus' love through word and deed, the more we experience it ourselves. As Clarke keeps his mom's spirit alive by following her example, so we, as Easter people, make the Spirit of God known far and wide.

SALEM COLLECTIONS -

The Caring Cupboard is a community food pantry, that has grown into a community necessity, that currently serves over 350 families living primarily in the Palmyra and Annville-Cleona School Districts. Products to be given to the Caring Cupboard may be placed on the designated shelves found at the end of the northwest hallway of Salem Church.

Pop Tab Collection Program (Matt Waller) Ronald McDonald House. The collection of aluminum beverage tabs began in 1996. The aluminum tabs are sold to a local recycling company and their proceeds help with daily operating expenses at the Ronald McDonald House. The generous amount from the tabs collected has been very beneficial to the House and the families they serve. They are averaging \$1,000 monthly just from these tiny tabs. You can help raise money by pulling tabs from any aluminum container. Pop Tabs may be placed in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance.

Redner's Cash Register Receipts (Cindy Steger) By using the Save-A-Tape card you picked up at Customer Service Desk each time you purchase merchandise at Redner's Warehouse Markets, your receipt will be designated as a Save-A-Tape customer receipt. When you come to Salem Church, place your entire register/sales receipt (DO NOT CUT!) in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance. Salem Church will receive a check for 1% of the total amount of tapes submitted, excluding items controlled by the government, such as tax, milk and tobacco products.

Clothing Recycling Old clothing and material that are too worn to use can be recycled. If possible, take to an H&M Store (they give you a coupon for each bag!), otherwise put it in the box in the west narthex and we'll take it for you. Thank you!

Writing Tool Recycling You can recycle old writing tools – crayons, markers, pens, and pencils. Staples Store will recycle these items as well as many other items (check their website!). Feel free to take to a Staples or place in the "Crayola marker" collection tube on the windowsill in the west narthex. Thank you!



Easter insights

Did you know the word *Easter* never appears in the Bible? It may be a variant of the name Eostre, a pagan fertility goddess who symbolized rebirth and spring. *Eostre* stems from the Proto-Germanic word for *dawn*, which Christians connect to Jesus' victory over darkness.

The ancient tradition of Easter baskets also has ties to Eostre, whose symbol was a rabbit. Christians likely adapted the practice of bringing eggs and seeds as an offering to Eostre. Some Orthodox Christians continue a tradition of having a priest bless baskets of Easter food on Holy Saturday. Items usually hold special symbolism, such as Paska bread, cured meats, colored eggs, salt, horseradish and lamb-shaped butter.
