In December, as we approached the Winter Solstice, our days shortened, the amount of (sun)light diminished, and we dwelt in approaching darkness. This time of year, can be hard for us. The literal darkness brings darker moods for some. Some live with Seasonal Affective Disorder struggling pro-

foundly with the waning light. However, it affects us, in one way or another, the fading light touched each of us.


The good news is that we are never left in that diminished light. After December 21st, the light starts coming back. As we gathered to celebrate Christmas, our days grew longer. The earth proclaimed its resistance to allowing the darkness to completely take over. Spiritually and liturgically, we are preparing ourselves for this coming light. First, we prepare ourselves in the light of Christmas. The warm glow of the incarnation illuminates our world. It was by design that the ancient Church leaders placed Christmas just a few days after the Winter Solstice because they saw in the patterns of nature a powerful metaphor for the Light of the World, Jesus, being born as flesh and blood.

This celebration of light continues into Epiphany. When we celebrate the visit of the Magi to the manger, we often think that it is the end of something as Epiphany closes our Christmas Season. Rather, Epiphany is the beginning of something as we celebrate a whole season of Epiphany. The Epiphany Season is a testimony to the growing light in the world. Spiritually in this time, we are continuing to proclaim Jesus as light of the world as testified to by the Star of Bethlehem. Epiphany is an opportunity for us to proclaim and bring light to our world.

This Christmas and Epiphany Season may we each endeavor, in our own ways, to proclaim and bring light into the world. As the shadows still dwell; as violence and power struggles still occur, we as Christians, as the Church, should reflect Christ's light out into the world. We can bring the light of Christ into people's lives, not just for a season, but as a regular practice of discipleship. If we endeavor to be people of kindness, grace, and justice in an angry, unforgiving me-first world, then we begin to not just talk about the Gospel but to live the Gospel. Our calling in this time of approaching light is to be people who endeavor to bring Jesus, the Light of the World, into the world.

May each of us be blessed by Christ's Light. May our hearts and souls be illuminated by the power of the incarnation. May the light of the Star of Bethlehem guide us to our spiritual home found in a manger. May our lives reflect the ways Christ's light has been made known us and the whole world! Peace,

SALEM COLLECTIONS -

The Caring Cupboard is a community food pantry, that has grown into a community necessity, that currently serves over 350 families living primarily in the Palmyra and Annville-Cleona School Districts. Products to be given to the Caring Cupboard may be placed on the designated shelves found at the end of the northwest hallway of Salem Church.

Pop Tab Collection Program (Matt Waller) Ronald McDonald House. The collection of aluminum beverage tabs began in 1996. The aluminum tabs are sold to a local recycling company and their proceeds help with daily operating expenses at the Ronald McDonald House. The generous amount from the tabs collected has been very beneficial to the House and the families they serve. They are averaging \$1,000 monthly just from these tiny tabs. You can help raise money by pulling tabs from any aluminum container. Pop Tabs may be placed in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance.

Redner's Cash Register Receipts (Cindy Steger) By using the Save-A-Tape card you picked up at Customer Service Desk each time you purchase merchandise at Redner's Warehouse Markets, your receipt will be designated as a Save-A-Tape customer receipt. When you come to Salem Church, place your entire register/sales receipt (DO NOT CUT!) in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance. Salem Church will receive a check for 1% of the total amount of tapes submitted, excluding items controlled by the government, such as tax, milk and tobacco products.

Clothing Recycling Old clothing and material that are too worn to use can be recycled. If possible, take to an H&M Store (they give you a coupon for each bag!), otherwise put it in the box in the west narthex and we'll take it for you. Thank you!

Writing Tool Recycling You can recycle old writing tools – crayons, markers, pens, and pencils. Staples Store will recycle these items as well as many other items (check their website!). Feel free to take to a Staples or place in the "Crayola marker" collection tube on the windowsill in the west narthex. Thank you!

MLK on what really matters



Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how he wanted to be remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."
