Why Observe Lent?

For Christians, Lent is not always the most popular of our seasons. Lent can challenge us. Penitence and contemplation are not easy practices to embrace. We might not be willing to give up things or to even to think about doing so. After all, it is not comfortable for us to examine our lives or confront head on the things that hinder our rela-

tionship with God and with other people. It is sometimes difficult to give up these distractions. Likewise, it takes effort to take up new spiritual practices and stick with them. It's demanding to add anything to our already busy routines. We may wonder why we must do these things in order to grow closer to God. Is there that an easier way?

Yet the repentance and discipline of Lent are at the very heart of the Gospel. The Common English Bible translates Jesus' mission as proclaiming to people "change [your] hearts and lives and trust the good news" (Mark 1:15, Matthew 3:2, and Luke 3:8 among others). In fact, the mission of the Church might be summarized as changing hearts and lives and announcing/proclaiming the Gospel and/ or the kingdom of God. Before we can change the world around us, we must endeavor to change our own hearts and lives and to trust for ourselves in the Good News of the Kingdom of God. This is why we do Lent. Our practices are about changing our own hearts and lives to reflect the heart and life of Jesus Christ. The reason why we observe Lent and its practices is to be able to hear once again for ourselves the Good News of Jesus Christ. Lent is a time for us to intentionally work on getting our hearts and lives in order. We do so by giving up and taking up.

The practices of Lent exist to help prepare ourselves to hear once again the Good News of Easter and Jesus' ministry. This is the Good News of grace and God's love. It takes time for us to arrive at the place where we hear such news not just with our ears, but with our souls. This is why the 40 days of Lent and its discipline and practice are so important. They afford us the time to prepare ourselves to hear the Gospel. So this Lent let us not just give up something; do not just take up something; do not ignore it. Change your hearts and lives; Trust in the Good News of the Kingdom of God!


We want our light to shine, so together with the Membership Committee, we have devised the **5** Acts of Friendliness; ways that we all can shine a light on

The Lenten desert



During the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year), Christians figuratively follow Jesus into the desert. Just as our Savior spent 40 days fasting and facing temptation, we focus on self-reflection and contrition.

In an 1873 hymn, Claudia Hernaman wrote, "O Lord, throughout these forty days, you prayed and kept the fast. Inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past." The desert experience of Lent serves a clear purpose, filling us up rather than depleting us. "This is what Lent is meant to be," writes theologian Ron Rolheiser. "Time in the desert to courageously face the chaos and the demons within us and to let God do battle with them through us. The result is that we are purified, made ready, so the intoxicating joy of Easter might then bind us more closely to God and each other."

SALEM COLLECTIONS -

The Caring Cupboard is a community food pantry, that has grown into a community necessity, that currently serves over 350 families living primarily in the Palmyra and Annville-Cleona School Districts. Products to be given to the Caring Cupboard may be placed on the designated shelves found at the end of the northwest hallway of Salem Church.

Pop Tab Collection Program (Matt Waller) Ronald McDonald House. The collection of aluminum beverage tabs began in 1996. The aluminum tabs are sold to a local recycling company and their proceeds help with daily operating expenses at the Ronald McDonald House. The generous amount from the tabs collected has been very beneficial to the House and the families they serve. They are averaging \$1,000 monthly just from these tiny tabs. You can help raise money by pulling tabs from any aluminum container. Pop Tabs may be placed in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance.

Redner's Cash Register Receipts (Cindy Steger) By using the Save-A-Tape card you picked up at Customer Service Desk each time you purchase merchandise at Redner's Warehouse Markets, your receipt will be designated as a Save-A-Tape customer receipt. When you come to Salem Church, place your entire register/sales receipt (DO NOT CUT!) in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance. Salem Church will receive a check for 1% of the total amount of tapes submitted, excluding items controlled by the government, such as tax, milk and tobacco products.

Clothing Recycling Old clothing and material that are too worn to use can be recycled. If possible, take to an H&M Store (they give you a coupon for each bag!), otherwise put it in the box in the west narthex and we'll take it for you. Thank you!

Writing Tool Recycling You can recycle old writing tools – crayons, markers, pens, and pencils. Staples Store will recycle these items as well as many other items (check their website!). Feel free to take to a Staples or place in the "Crayola marker" collection tube on the windowsill in the west narthex. Thank you!
