Do we trust in the resurrection? Diana Butler Bass' perhaps provocative statement challenges us to live our lives not only believing in the resurrection of Jesus but also trusting in and expecting resurrection to still happen in our midst.

Looking for resurrection in the world around us takes practice. The good news is that we are given the time we need to practice trusting in and looking for resurrection. In the life of the church, we make Easter not just one day, but a way of life. Liturgically, we celebrate fifty days of Easter between Resurrection Sunday and the Day of Pentecost. Theologically, Christians over the centuries have testified to the idea that every Sunday is a "little Easter"; every Sunday is an opportunity for us as "practice" our faith as Christians; every time we gather as a community of faith we are called to remember Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.

Every time we connect with God in worship, song, and prayer there is an opportunity for us to be transformed and experience new life in ourselves and in the world. Resurrection changes us. Scripture describes a resurrected Jesus that was not always easily recognized by those who knew him best, the disciples. The resurrected Jesus has changed, and so will we in our own resurrections.

From the moment of that first Easter Sunday, Jesus' first disciples were changed. After the resurrection, they lived in radical new ways. They were blessed by the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, went to the ends of the earth preaching, and stood boldly before those who wanted to silence them. They did these things to build the Church; they did these things to bring about God's upside-down kingdom that blesses the poor and the outcast; they did these things because they could not remain silent about what they had experienced. The New Testament is filled with stories of faithful men and women who not only believed in the resurrection of Jesus but trusted it enough to live their lives differently because of it. Post Resurrection they knew their lives belonged to Jesus and no one else; the followers of Jesus committed themselves wholeheartedly to the Resurrected One, Jesus the Christ, and held nothing back.

They committed themselves; they held nothing back after not only believing in Resurrection but trusting in it for themselves and their lives. May we put our trust in resurrection as well.

Secretary's report and approval of old minutes

Treasurer's Report (Tom Peiffer):

Tom provided a written report

General fund giving was down more than 20% from 2024 for this same period (January and February) period. However, looking at the last 5 years, we are collecting about the average for these two months.

Reviewing General Fund receipts versus expenditures, we had a deficit of \$8,500 for the two months.

Tom reviewed the Benevolences paid. We are holding off in paying any Phoenix Youth Center budgeted benevolences for now. Waiting on Missions Committee to recommend the appropriate action going forward.

There were no large unexpected bills / repairs needed

Funds will be transferred from the United Church Funds to make the Cemetery Fund cash positive

The Penn Central Conference renewed our PA Sales Tax Exemption until 2/28/2030

Pastor's Report

Paster Hoover provided a written report.

Revelation bible study is finished

Confirmation class is going well – it's a condensed session causing the class to have more reading and work each week

Discussion question – We hosted Ash Wednesday with the Methodist church and collected \$217 as offering. Decided to split offering with the Methodist church, motion by unanimous consent.

Old Business:

Update on negotiation with Londonderry Inn for use of parking lot (Tom in place of Matt)

- Parking lot between the Methodist church and the Inn is owned by Salem, but rarely used
- Londonderry often uses the lot for large events
- In the past they've offered donations to Salem, but over the recent years that has stopped. They did indicate they were paying for snow removal in recent years, but that has yet to be confirmed.

Don Umberger has been talking with them: They are not interested in paying the suggested \$100 per month rent, initially proposed. They did, however, provide a recent \$250 donation in February to Salem, in response to Don's discussion with them.

• They offered to buy the lot for \$60k. Private realtor appraised for \$89k. This value may go up if Campbelltown development goes through.

Discussion on gathering more facts – such as what we are paying in property tax, mowing, and additional insurance

Tom will research property tax

Building and Grounds will take the topic offline and come back to council with proposal(s) for the lot prior to any further discussions with Londonderry.

Profile Committee:

Meeting was February 11, next meeting March 11

Choosing questions from the profile that we can answer right now. Each member of the committee is taking questions and answering on our own then we come together and review the answers together to make sure we are answering in one voice. Last meeting we realized that we have character limits so we learned we cannot be as descriptive as we started to be.

Discussion about Trinity UCC and joint pastor search

Trinity reaffirmed their interest in discussing some sort of joint pastor search They offered dates to meet that coincide with Holy week or with Florence's memorial....we counter offered. Waiting to hear. Potentially 4/23.

New Business:

Tom Peiffer discussed the lawn mowing contract. The company proposed this year to be up 5-6%. We countered and they countered. They are proposing a fixed amount for the year.

Anthony does an excellent job and it is not easy to mow around gravestones.

Tom made a motion to retain Loffreda Lawncare: \$12,750 fixed amount (retainer) for the season, including monthly billings \$110 weekly (church grounds and exterior of cemetery), \$650 for the cemetery interior including string trimming the headstones up to biweekly, and \$50 for the swale as needed. Loffreda will track the mowing services during the mowing season and we will pay for the surplus over the retainer amount. The retainer will be paid in monthly.

Second by Jared Cooper, motion passed by vote.

Building, Grounds, Cemetery (Jared) – Mowing discussion. Furnace room has been cleaned out again. Discussion of crackly sound system and gentleman that Darrel Woomer knows (helped us set up the iPhone for Facebook previously) and if he can help us with this sound problem.

SALEM COLLECTIONS -

The Caring Cupboard is a community food pantry, that has grown into a community necessity, that currently serves over 350 families living primarily in the Palmyra and Annville-Cleona School Districts. Products to be given to the Caring Cupboard may be placed on the designated shelves found at the end of the northwest hallway of Salem Church.

Pop Tab Collection Program (Matt Waller) Ronald McDonald House. The collection of aluminum beverage tabs began in 1996. The aluminum tabs are sold to a local recycling company and their proceeds help with daily operating expenses at the Ronald McDonald House. The generous amount from the tabs collected has been very beneficial to the House and the families they serve. They are averaging \$1,000 monthly just from these tiny tabs. You can help raise money by pulling tabs from any aluminum container. Pop Tabs may be placed in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance.

Redner's Cash Register Receipts (Cindy Steger) By using the Save-A-Tape card you picked up at Customer Service Desk each time you purchase merchandise at Redner's Warehouse Markets, your receipt will be designated as a Save-A-Tape customer receipt. When you come to Salem Church, place your entire register/sales receipt (DO NOT CUT!) in the designated box on the shelf above the coat rack in the bell tower entrance. Salem Church will receive a check for 1% of the total amount of tapes submitted, excluding items controlled by the government, such as tax, milk and tobacco products.

Clothing Recycling Old clothing and material that are too worn to use can be recycled. If possible, take to an H&M Store (they give you a coupon for each bag!), otherwise put it in the box in the west narthex and we'll take it for you. Thank you!

Writing Tool Recycling You can recycle old writing tools – crayons, markers, pens, and pencils. Staples Store will recycle these items as well as many other items (check their website!). Feel free to take to a Staples or place in the "Crayola marker" collection tube on the windowsill in the west narthex. Thank you!



Loving my "enemies"

In polarized times, when people view huge concepts such as justice, government policy and care for neighbors differently, how do we follow Jesus' command to love our enemies? I prefer the word *opponents*, but our Lord's instructions still stand.

In the Bible, "love" doesn't mean liking someone; it means caring for them, treating them kindly. I find *The Message* paraphrase of Luke 6:27-36 helpful: "Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst," Jesus says about one's enemies. So, when I contact government leaders to express my opinions, I address them with respect, whether I agree with them or not. When I encounter a neighbor whose views oppose mine, I ask myself what I would want them to do for me, whether help with an errand or be friendly. Then, as The Message puts it, I "grab the initiative and do it for *them*."

And this, which might be the hardest: Amid tough times, Jesus says, "Respond with the supple moves of prayer." It's human nature to pray that God change our enemies' or opponents' minds. But it's more Christlike to pray for their health, their families and whatever *God* desires for them, not what *I* want. Can I do this? With God's help,
